



VICTIM NOTIFICATION

The Glendale Police Department transports those in custody to the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) Detention Center.

Subsequently, the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office detention personnel provide victim notification regarding offender status in Victim Rights Act cases.

Some counties in Colorado, through which the offender may be processed for other crimes, may use the VINELINK.com automated notification process.

The correctional authorities will make victim notification of changes in status of the accused prior to the final disposition of the case, if requested.

Those changes may include:

- Booked into custody
- Released from custody
- Transfer of prisoner
- Escape of prisoner

VICTIM RESPONSIBILITIES

The victim has the responsibility to keep authorities informed of any change in address, phone or name so that they can be:

- Informed of and heard regarding any reconsideration of a sentence, or parole, or to be informed when a convicted person is placed in or transferred to a less secure facility/ program or is transferred or released from any state hospital;
- Contacted by the courts to be informed of the filing of a petition to cease sex offender registration;
- Notified of any changes in status of any cold case for which the statute of limitations is longer than three years.

If you have questions concerning the prosecution of your case, or modification of protection orders, contact the District Attorney's Office.

If you do not understand the terms used by the officer or what stages normally occur in the investigation and prosecution of your case, please ask us!

Any person attempting "defense-initiated" victim contact, should immediately provide you full and unambiguous disclosure of their legal name and the fact that the person is acting as an agent for the person accused of the crime or for the defense team of such person.

The RIGHTS of VICTIMS of CRIME

The GLENDALE POLICE DEPARTMENT

If you are a victim of any crime listed in this pamphlet, the Colorado Constitution guarantees you the right to be informed, present and heard when relevant, at all critical stages of the criminal justice process related to that crime. This brochure is designed to assist you in exercising these rights.

FAST TRACK –DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

The Colorado Constitution guarantees rights to the victims of the following crimes. (If the victim is deceased or incapacitated, these rights are guaranteed to the victim's spouse, parent, child, sibling, grandchild, grandparent, significant other, or other lawful representative).

- Murder, manslaughter
- Criminally negligent homicide & vehicular homicide
- Assaults (1st, 2nd, 3rd or vehicular)
- Menacing
- Kidnapping
- Sexual Assault / Unlawful Sexual Contact
- Invasion of privacy for sexual gratification
- Incest & aggravated incest
- Child abuse / Other crimes against children
- Sexual exploitation of children
- Crimes against at-risk adults/at-risk juveniles
- Indecent exposure
- Violation of a criminal protection order issued against a person for sex assault or stalking
- Robbery-aggravated, aggravated of a controlled substance
- Crimes for which the underlying foundation is determined to be domestic violence
- Careless driving resulting in death
- Failure to stop at a scene of an accident that results in another's death/serious injury
- Harassment by stalking
- Bias motivated crime /Ethnic intimidation
- Tampering with a victim or witness
- Retaliation against a victim, witness, judge, juror or prosecutor
- 1st degree burglary
- Human trafficking (adults & children)
- Posting a private image for harassment or pecuniary gain
- Any criminal attempt or conspiracy, criminal solicitation, or accessory involving any of the crimes above.

VICTIMS OF THE CRIMES PREVIOUSLY LISTED HAVE THE RIGHT TO:

- Treatment with fairness, dignity and respect
- Information on all charges filed & assurance of swift and fair resolution of the proceedings
- To be informed of and present for all critical stages of the criminal justice process
- To receive info on any final decision to file or not to file the case against the accused
- Notification of any change in status of the accused
- Information on restitution & civil remedy
- Release of property (upon request) after the case is settled and is no longer needed as evidence
- To be free from intimidation, abuse, or harassment
- Employer intercession regarding court appearance and meetings with justice officials
- Notification of all case dispositions including appeals
- Timely notification of all court dates
- A secure waiting area when available
- Protection from the person accused
- Be informed of results of any ordered HIV testing
- To be present & heard regarding bond reduction/modification, acceptance of a plea agreement or sentencing
- Consult with the District Attorney prior to any disposition of the case & before the case goes to trial
- Prepare a victim impact statement & to be present and/or heard at the sentencing hearing.

As a victim of crime, you may be entitled to the following services:

- Immediate crisis intervention & follow up support
- Special services for juveniles, elderly or those with disabilities
- Referrals to individuals & organizations to assist in recovery which may provide:
 - *Medical or emergency services*
 - *Mental health or social services*
 - *Financial Assistance*
 - *Translation services*
 - *Intervention with creditors, landlords and employers as it relates to the effects of the crime*
 - *Legal resources*
 - *Rehabilitative services*
 - *Transportation & child care to assist with the prosecution*
 - *Information about obtaining public records, including police reports*
 - *Information about obtaining protection orders & mandatory orders automatically in place*
 - *Other support services*
- The right to pursue a civil case against the accused

Depending on the circumstances, you may also qualify for financial assistance from the **VICTIM COMPENSATION FUND**

After conviction of a crime against a victim, your state or local correctional authorities will notify you of:

- The institution where the offender is incarcerated or otherwise being held
- The projected release date of the person
- Any release of the person, including furlough, work release, or community corrections in advance of release
- Scheduled parole hearing for the person & any change in hearing schedules
- Any escape of the person from the correctional facility program
- Any release & conditions of that release
- The death of the person while in a correctional facility or program

Upon written request of the victim, officials will also keep confidential: the victim's or immediate family's addresses, phone numbers, place of employment, & other personal information. This includes reasonable efforts to exclude/redact social security numbers when records are released to other than victims, defense attorneys, or criminal justice agencies that have duties under this article.

If all local efforts to obtain your rights have failed, you may request assistance from the Crime Victims Service Advisory Board.
