


Message from the Chief

Please allow me this opportunity to introduce myself. My name is Chief W.J. Haskins. While I have had the privilege of serving the City of Glendale for quite some time, 2013 marked my first year as Chief of Police. I was raised in this area, attending schools in Capitol Hill before going to the University of Montana. After graduation, I returned to Colorado. I began my career in law enforcement in 1988 with the Sheridan Police Department, and I joined the Glendale Police Department in 1994. I have had the honor of serving as a Field Training Instructor, I have helped develop a whole variety of programs in use by the Glendale Police Department, I wrote a computerized reporting system for the department, and I have served at virtually every level of the department.

The City of Glendale is known for its innovation and high level of service, and the Glendale Police Department is proud to be a part of this great team. We are renewing our commitment to serving our community. In 2013, we implemented the Community Liaison Office for Urban Development (CLOUD) unit. This unit serves as a dedicated portal for interaction with the various stakeholders in the community. While our patrol officers deal with the day-to-day necessities of law enforcement and our detectives handle our ongoing investigations, our CLOUD officers take a more proactive, community-directed approach. This means building partnerships with our businesses, our apartment managers, and our residents.



S.T.A.R. Training (Survival, Treatment, and Rescue)


The tragedies such as those of Columbine, Virginia Tech, Bailey, and Aurora, Colorado continues to underscore the need to get tailored medical training and specially designed trauma kits into the hands of Peace Officers. These brave men and women have inherited a task for which they are not accustomed and as such, are in need of the tools and techniques to deliver the future victims of violence from harm.

This training is primarily designed for patrol officers responding to victims of violence in which Emergency Medical Technicians may be absent or overwhelmed. This produces a well-prepared law enforcement officer that is capable of surviving in a chaotic and violent situation, in which he or she is injured or is responding to aid a fellow officer(s).





Preparing today for tomorrow's threats! "Active Shooter" training is a specialized training that teaches team movement and solo strategies, to save the lives of innocent victims. Since the shootings at Columbine, agencies train "differently", learning not just accuracy with their firearms but a new perception & mind-set.



Patrol Division ~ Supervisor: Lt. John Quinn

2013 saw a number of changes in the Operations Division of the Glendale Police Department. As former Patrol Division Commander W.J. Haskins was sworn in as Police Chief, John Quinn was promoted to Lieutenant and began his tenure as this division's commander. We said good-bye to a few of our members, and swore in former Interns Chad Lucero and Ruben Montour as officers, and also welcomed new recruit Erick Skelton to our team. Promotions also were awarded to Phil Saraff and Derrick Stevens who are now sergeants in the patrol division, and Sergeant Greg Cazzell who is now Sergeant of Detectives.

Training continued to be a focus in 2013. Officers received extensive in-service training on subjects as varied as Victims' Rights, the needs of disabled victims, active shooter, interview and interrogation. 2014 promises to be as exciting as 2013, with new and energetic officers on board.





Support Division ~ Supervisor: Lt. Jamie Dillon

The Support Services Division is comprised of the Communications Unit, Records Unit, Victim Advocate Unit, Information Technology Unit, Criminal Investigations Unit and the Crime Scene/Evidence Unit.

The Communications Unit was pleased to welcome Beth Hough and Athena Deveraux in 2013.

The records department while processing 3,538 police reports for the current year and relocating to an even more secure office space, managed to transfer most hardcopy files to digital. Statistics include

- 239 Arapahoe County summonses
- 115 Glendale municipal criminal summonses
- 284 Glendale municipal traffic summonses
- 15 Glendale municipal juvenile summonses
- 24 Glendale parking tickets




The Victim's Assistant Unit provided "on-scene" assistance to 35 victims and/or their families, and also initiated contact with almost 225 others by phone or letter correspondence. The unit also enabled crime victims in Glendale to obtain over \$41,000 from charitable organizations and the 18th Judicial Victims' Compensation Board in restitution, counseling fees, medical bills, rent and other payments.




The Evidence Unit processed three major crime scenes, 10 lesser crime scenes, booked in over 2,000 items for officers and purged approximately 400 items from evidence.

Community Liaison Officers of Urban Development

Through various innovative city projects, such as the City of Glendale's Infinity Park Rugby Stadium, the City Set Project, and the continuing development of the Riverwalk project, the Glendale Police Department has re-imagined many of their policing methods. *Concierge Policing* has become the central focus and every stakeholder of the Glendale Police Department places an emphasis on assisting every community member in their specific endeavors to succeed. It is with the commitment to the *Concierge Policing* methodology that the Glendale Police Department has created a new division, that of the Community Liaison Officer of Urban Development (CLOUD). These positions have been established to proactively reduce and deter criminal activity, and to create active partnerships through collaboration, cooperation and coordination with the diverse businesses and community members that are the foundation of the City of Glendale.



The CLOUD officer's flexibility and imagination allows the influence of *Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design* (CPTED) practices within architectural surveys of new developments and other businesses. Glendale maintains their motivation to the CPTED concept by training and certifying partnering departments, such as Public Works. Looking towards the future, CPTED principles will be incorporated in the liquor license renewal processes going forward. CPTED certified, Officer Baumgartner recently assisted in a multi-agency project for Adams County School District 14, as well as having identified resource allocations for hotel response through a collaborative statistical analysis of all hotels within the City of Glendale

The Glendale Police Department, CLOUD Division was highlighted in the December 2013, 4th quarter Edition of *The Practitioner*, a magazine published by the International Society of Crime Prevention Practitioners.

They maintain a partnership with the Home Depot during the Home Depot Kids Workshop days, the first Saturday of every month, and they have reached out to the City's other retailers such as Staples, Whole Foods, Target and King Soopers, creating quarterly Loss Prevention meetings. Through this cooperation, there was a significant decline of store loss among these participants, allowing for more taxable merchandise to be sold.





Serious Crime

Events by Nature








**2013 marks new court structure so tickets include juvenile*



Use of Force Report



Police officers are trained to seek voluntary compliance in their lawful direction, however, they are sometimes met with circumstances in which a subject's actions compel them to use force in order to gain compliance or defend themselves and others against serious injury or death. The Glendale Police Department utilizes a "Use of Force Report" as a monitoring and evaluation method to analyze these situations. All reports are reviewed by members of the Command Staff for appropriateness and to determine opportunities for improvement and training if necessary.
